In February, our conference delegates took part in a model United Nations debate at Alfrink College in The Netherlands. We are also preparing for our forthcoming exchange trips to Cadiz and Rome and volunteering experience in Ghana in 2017. We are also working much closer to home. We are in conversation with other schools about development of multi-academy trusts and these discussions have been brought more sharply into focus following the Chancellor of the Exchequer's announcements last week and the publication of an Education White Paper. KS4 High Achievers

Our pupils impressed him with the way they approached the text and one Year 11 pupil, Saskia May, suggested an idea he had never thought of in all his years of teaching the poem to A level students. We are pleased that John is able to visit again on 21 April to run a further session on preparing for the Unseen Poetry exam for Year 11 pupils hoping to achieve an A or A* grade in this summer's GCSE English Literature exam. Selected pupils will receive an invitation after Easter.

Spine Chillers

Earlier this academic year, as part of 'English Faculty in Focus 2015' all pupils in Years 7-10 wrote a 'Spine Chillers' mini saga for the most recent 'Young Writers' competition. Established 25 years ago, Young Writers aims to encourage young people to engage in creative writing by inviting schools to participate in national poetry and creative writing competitions. A mini saga is only 100 words long and our pupils were challenged to focus on their choice of vocabulary, in addition to structuring a whole story in few words.

Last month, we were delighted to hear that the work of 52 of our pupils has been selected for publication in the latest 'Young Writers' book 'Spine Chillers'. Their writing was selected out of thousands of entries nationally, on the basis of its perception, imagination, expression and creativity. The English Faculty are eagerly awaiting the publication of 'Spine Chillers' on 30 April. Following this, pupils whose work has been selected can look forward to receiving their invitation to an exciting 'Spine Chillers' Book Launch.



Many of our Year 10 pupils have been studying William Golding's novel 'Lord of the Flies' for the Modern Texts section of their GCSE English Literature examination. On Thursday 14 January 63 pupils, accompanied by five members of staff, travelled to the Theatre Royal Bath, to watch a production by the Regents Park Theatre company. This production has been described as "Unmissable...nothing less than a triumph" and the pupils weren't disappointed.



Following the trip, they discussed their reactions to the novel's adaptation for the stage, particularly its updating from the 1950s for a modern audience. 

UK Intermediate Maths Challenge

UK INTERMEDIATE MATHEMATICAL CHALLENGE

"The Maths Challenge asks a series of multiple choice questions in quite an abstract way. They require thinking outside of the box as you need to eliminate all but one answer which can be tricky. You also need to beware as wrong answers to the questions at the end of the paper count against your score so it can be better to not answer them at all unless you are sure you are correct. That said, it was demanding, I enjoyed it and I hope to do even better next year." Oli, Year 10.

Back at the beginning of February, 65 pupils from Years 9, 10 and 11 volunteered to compete against other pupils from across the country for the much coveted Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates awarded by the UK Mathematics Trust in recognition of problem solving excellence. After an hour of chewing pencils and furrowing brows, the scripts were sent off to be marked electronically; and after what seemed like an endless wait, the results were returned amid scenes of barely contained delirium (amongst the Maths teachers anyway). This year's entrants didn't disappoint, with 23 certificates being awarded of varying hues. The overall best in school was awarded to Isabelle C in Year 11 and she also achieved a Gold. Year 10 was topped by Oliver P and in Year 9 Elliot T not only beat the other members of his year group, he also qualified for the next round of the competition.



The largest celebration of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) for young people in the UK, the event aims to show young people the exciting and rewarding opportunities out there for them with the right experience and qualifications.

Bringing classroom learning to life, pupils had access to a wide range of workshops and activities, from witnessing a live heart dissection and racing world class athletes through an accelerator tunnel, to assembling models of JCBs at speed and auditioning to be weather or sports presenters in the BBC tent. Also on display at the event was a full size model of The Bloodhound car, designed to reach speeds of up to 1000mph.

Horticulture

Polli:Nation

With the Spring Equinox having passed, with birds busy looking for nesting sites, with the days warming up, it means Spring is here and no doubt you will be thinking about getting into the garden during the Easter break. 2016 will see Cirencester Deer Park School embarking on a 3 year project with local primary schools Chesterton, Powells and Stratton. This journey will see the four schools working together to create spaces within our school grounds to encourage pollinators. Read more about the Polli:Nation programme which will be transforming outdoor spaces to become pollinator-friendly habitats, with the support of the national school grounds charity, Learning through Landscapes.

If you are out in the garden think of the bees and use our handy guide to select easy growing POLLI:NATION plants that would benefit pollinators.











Knapweeds and cornflowers (Centaurea species): Both rich in nectar and are visited by a range of different bee species, including the red-tailed bumblebee (Bombus lapidarius). Wild plant varieties include common Knapweed (Centaurea nigra), greater Knapweed (Centaurea scabiosa) and the blue cornflower (Centaurea cyanus), all of which can be grown easily from seed. There are also several garden varieties, such as the perennial cornflower (Centaurea Montana).

Scabious: Several different plants are collectively referred to as scabious; field scabious (Knautia arvensis), devil's bit scabious (Succisa pratensis) and small scabious (Scabiosa columbaria). All of which are freely worked by a range of different bee species for both nectar and pollen. The nectar in the flower of scabious plants is protected from rain by hairs in the flower tube.

Viper's bugloss (Echium vulgare): Nectar is produced very freely and is protected inside the flower, from evaporation (when it's hot) or being flushing away (when it rains). A range of different bumblebee species will visit Viper's bugloss plants as well as some of the larger solitary bee species, such as the flower bee (Anthophora species) and leaf-cutter bee (Megachile species)

Foxgloves (Digitalis purpurea): Foxgloves are loved by bumblebees, particularly long-tongued bumblebees such as the garden bumblebee (Bombus hortorum) and common carder bee (Bombus pascuorum). Interestingly foxglove flowers start off male (pollen producing) and become female (nectar producing), flowering starts from the bottom of the flower spike and moves upwards. Thus bees can collect nectar from the bottom of the flower spike and pollen from the top as they work the plant from bottom to top.

Speedwell (Veronica species): Garden speedwell (Veronica longifolia) has long flower spikes and is in flower for a long time. Its flowers never fail to attract honeybees and bumblebees in large numbers. No bee garden should be without this plant. If you have a pond, water speedwell (Veronica anagallisaquatica) is a welcome bee friendly addition.

Lungwort (Pulmonaria species): Lungwort is a very good early source of nectar for long-tongued bees and queen bumblebees, as well as the hairy-footed flower bee (Anthophora plumipes). Female hairy-footed flower bees, which are all black, can be seen darting around the flowers in spring. Lungwort flowers change from red to blue when they have been pollenated.

Borage (Borago officinalis) Although Borage is an introduced species, it has been grown in the British Isles for many centuries. The plant is easy to grow and succeeds in most soils. The nodding flowers yield nectar freely over a long flowering season. Owing to the inverted position of the flower the nectar is not easily washed out by rain. Bumblebees will hang underneath the flowers and buzz the anthers using buzz pollination, producing a cloud of pollen.

Bellflowers (Campanula species): Bellflowers are visited for nectar and pollen by a range of different bee species. Sheep's bit scabious (Jasione Montana) is not, despite the name, closely related to other scabious species, but is in the same family as the bellflower.



Duke of Edinburgh Award

35 Year 10 pupils received their DofE Bronze Award on Thursday 10 March. They should be rightly be proud of their achievements and they are great ambassadors for this unique experience which opens doors to education and employment opportunities. Well done all of you!



The current Year 9 participants are busy completing their Volunteering, Physical and Skills activities. During the Training Day in May they will be off timetable to learn first aid, equipment, cooking, tent erecting, orienteering and map reading in preparation for their Expedition. They will begin to plot their routes for the forthcoming practice Expedition during Enrichment Week. DofE candidates will need to prove their mettle in order to qualify for the final expedition in September.

Millions of young people across the globe, from all backgrounds and circumstances, have gained their DofE Award over the last 60 years. As part of the DofE Diamond Anniversary celebrations Ellen Foster and Simon Crew in Year 10, who both recently received their Bronze Awards, had the privilege of performing at a private champagne reception for HRH Prince Edward on Wednesday 16 March at Bath Priory Hotel. They played as part of a guitar quartet from the Corinium Players for an hour to approximately 18 guests. Before going into dinner HRH Prince Edward stayed and chatted to Ellen and Simon about their Bronze Award achievements and how they used their musical skills as part of the award—They used musical skills as progress in preparing for exams and Music Festivals as well as performing for Corinium Players.

International contacts open windows into different cultures and countries, preparing our pupils for life in a global society.

Ghana 2017

Twenty seven pupils in Year 9 are signed up for an exciting trip to Ghana in April 2017 with African Adventures.

Our group is well balanced but we need to develop a stronger sense of team and learn to work alongside and support each other over the next 12 months. Languages at University



On Thursday 14 January, fourteen of our Year 8 Languages pupils attended a Subject Enrichment Day at UWE, University of the West of England in Bristol. We attended a lecture on studying languages, had tours of the campus by student ambassadors, language sessions in Spanish, French and German and a taster workshop in Russian! After lunch we had opportunities to speak to university students about student life, their courses and to gain career advice. It was an excellent opportunity to exchange experiences with university students, to raise aspiration to Higher Education and to attend lectures on the importance of multicultural awareness. Reflecting on the day, Year 8 pupils commented: "This has been a brilliant opportunity and I think everybody should have a chance to do languages. I only wish I could study more." 




Inter Tutor Group Tournaments

Humanities in Focus

In February the theme of our Humanities in Focus week was the role of global ambassadors. Assemblies and activities challenged pupils to consider their place, purpose and responsibilities in an increasingly connected global community.

Assemblies for all year groups commemorated and raised awareness of the Holocaust. This is still a powerful topic which has allowed us to reflect on the atrocities of the past as well as the steps taken since then with the creation of the UN to tackle a variety of issues confronting humanity today.

During the week tutor groups guessed 'Where in the World are the Deer Park Staff?' 15 members of staff have shared their holiday snaps from around the World and were been disguised for pupils to identify who they are and where they are. Staff and pupils were also challenged to test their global knowledge with a quiz to see how many countries they could name in a limited space of time. Both activities aimed to broaden horizons and inspire an interest in the wider world. The challenges prompted a number of conversations about the diversity of global landscapes, cultures and lifestyles.

Across the department and school as a whole a number of trips will reinforce this theme. The MUNA trip to the Netherlands, opportunities to visit Berlin and Iceland this year as well as a planned trip to Ghana during Easter 2017 for example will all expand pupils' knowledge of the world outside the classroom. 


Financial Awareness

On Monday 8 February, all pupils in Year 9 had their timetable suspended for the day to enable them to take part in the Financial Awareness Conference. Pupils spent the day in their tutor groups and received a series of sessions delivered by a Deer Park teacher accompanied by staff from St James's Place Wealth Management. Pupils were led through five sessions: What is Money Worth? Wants vs Needs, Budgeting, Understanding Debt and Personal Aspirations. After the build-up from the first two sessions pupils were each given a family scenario where they were exposed to the cost of living. Pupils had to calculate the difference between gross and net pay and then tax. Pupils were really surprised at the stoppages. They were shown a graph to clarify how taxation is spent (see below).

Then, pupils examined the subject of debt. They were shocked at the difference in interest charged by the various lenders. All were aware of the interest-free credit from television advertisements such as DFS but were rather taken aback by store cards, for example Top Shop. Pupils were made aware of organisations that could help them should they ever find themselves in financial difficulties, for example The Money Advice Service.

Pupils were able to make links throughout the day to the importance of saving. From the evaluations at the end of the day pupils both recognised the value of the day in preparing them for the future and were much more financially savvy!

Young people face more advertising and opportunities to get into debt than ever before. By giving us the opportunity to work together and spend a day supporting all the Deer Park Year 9 students, we hope to have given those students more of the tools to help them make informed choices. Looking at life skills of budgeting, understanding loans, interest, tax while investigating issues around the morality of money and social value sparked debate and thought in students as they can already see these issues present in their own lives.' 'For me, having the opportunity to deliver financial education to students is really important. I didn't understand the risks of store card debt and got into difficulties after school. I wish I'd had some more knowledge about how debt works and why businesses use these sales methods. Looking back it's obvious, but at 18 I just didn't think like that. I hope that by being able to talk to students about my experience while helping to deliver a course will help them to understand how the topics relate to the real world and the choices they will soon have.' 'For me the Financial Education course is a way for me to give something back to the community and help the students get a better understanding and gain knowledge on financial options that they may come across in the future. It's important to play my part to ensure everyone had some knowledge on the key subjects like budgeting and what debt is.

It is essential that everyone knows what debt is and how budgeting for day-to-day life and understanding the difference between your wants and needs can avoid you getting into tricky situations. It was also really beneficial for the students to get an understanding on the different methods of loans and what they are. As this course wasn't available when I was at school, I think it will really make the students think twice when they're old enough to get things such as credit cards, bank loans etc. because they now understand what they are and make decisions on what's best for them, especially as a few of the students in my class were considering University. This is knowledge that I didn't have but most certainly would have benefited from.' Lauren Waldron, Treasury Assistant – Finance. SJP




BBC micro:bit

The BBC micro:bit, a pocket-sized codeable computer with motion detection, a built-in compass and Bluetooth technology, is to be given free to a million Year 7 pupils in the UK. The ambition of this BBC education initiative is to inspire digital creativity and develop a new generation of tech pioneers, to encourage children to get actively involved in writing software for computers and building new things, rather than being consumers of media

Although there have been delays with the BBC micro:bit, we are eagerly anticipating the delivery of the mini computers just after the Easter break! <u>Watch this video</u> to find out more.

At Deer Park we have fully embraced the new computing curriculum, with pupils learning about programming techniques right from Year 7. All our Year 7s should receive a micro:bit and it is expected that pupils will be using the mini computers after half term, having completed the current unit on Scratch programming in their ICT lessons.



In preparation for this activity, our pupils can access the <u>MicroBit website</u> and start coding straight away using the emulator— we recommend that they start with the Microsoft Block Editor.

Stratton Buses

We have been advised by Gloucestershire County Council that with effect from Monday 11 April the **Pulhams Coaches** serving Stratton will no longer run. However, **Stagecoach** provide a **51A** service which GCC advises us will run as follows:

Morning - pupils could get the service 51A from Stratton, Overhill Road at 08:07. This gets to Chesterton, opposite the Cemetery at 08:25; this is a short walk from school using the underpass.

Afternoon - pupils could get the service 51A at 15:37 from opposite the Cemetery that would get back to Stratton, Overhill Road for 16:07. Alternatively they could walk into town and catch the 51 service from the Corn Hall @ 16:15, which will get them back to Stratton for 16:24.
