Message from the Head

Our pupils in <u>Year 11 left to go on study leave</u> on Friday 27 May and we marked the occasion with a special lunch followed by a last assembly in which we reflected on their experiences with us. Their behaviour throughout the exam period was impeccable and we celebrated the end of their time with us on Friday 1 July at their <u>Leavers' Ball</u>. Once again the Hall was transformed by Karen Grinnell and her team to give them a Hollywood-style red carpet reception! Our 'Class of 2016' can collect their exam results from Reception after 9.15am on Thursday 25 August.

As Year 11 left, we rolled our timetable forward and, from Tuesday 7 June, all pupils moved into their 'new' year groups. This is a unique feature of Deer Park and one that enables us to maintain the momentum of learning throughout the school year. While challenging for teachers, it is appreciated by pupils and their parents.

This has been a busy term - we have hosted seven Year 5 Open Mornings and six Year 6 Welcome Evenings. On Monday 13 June we welcomed 74 of our new Year 7 pupils to our Primary Challenge Day and the whole year group joined us for their formal Induction Days on Thursday 14 and Friday 15 July. Our new pupils appeared to adapt to Deer Park quickly and they made a very positive impression on their teachers. We look forward to working with them again in September.

Our annual <u>Enrichment Week</u> was another highlight for many pupils and, as the reports from each activity show, our pupils took advantage of the opportunities at home and abroad and embraced every challenge!

Following a review of our pastoral structure we will be introducing some changes from September 2016. Assistant Head, **James Johnson** will continue to be the strategic lead and **Simon Bellamy** will be our new Pastoral Team Leader for 2016-17. **Glynn Reed** will be Assistant Pastoral Team Leader. Simon Bellamy will manage our new team of Year Leaders, who as members of our support staff team, will take responsibility for each year group: **Sue Cowley** will be our Year 7 Year Leader, **Rosie Stevens**, Year 8 Year Leader, **Louise Stubbs**, Year 10 Year Leader and **Anne Burfoot**, Year 11 Year Leader. **Fiona Moss** will continue to manage Year 9.

This term we say goodbye to Carl Elliott, Head of Computing and Business, Tom Machin, Assistant Head of Design, Emily Belcher, SENCO, and Music teacher, Megan Townsend who are all moving onto similar roles in their new schools. Lindsay Crew, Assistant SENCO, has been appointed temporarily to the post of SENCO from September 2016 and Martin Peake joins us from St Peter's High School as Team Leader for Computing and ICT. Cath Brace has been appointed to the Strategic Leadership Team as a temporary Assistant Head for 2016-17.

I am also very grateful to governors Deryck Nash and Margaret Edney who are retiring from the Board after years of loyal service.

Looking forward to next term, we will be celebrating 50 years of comprehensive education in Cirencester with a special commemorative event on Wednesday 12 October. UK Junior Maths Challenge

Deer Park pupils in Years 7 and Year 8 achieved 1 Gold, 6 Silvers and 12 Bronzes in this year's UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. Over 250,000 pupils from across the UK sat the Junior Maths Challenge, with roughly the top 6% receiving a Gold certificate, the next 13% Silver and the next 21% Bronze. Our highest achievers were James in Year 8 and Isaac and Amber in Year 7. Amber commented "I enjoyed it because I like solving maths problems and being challenged." Congratulations to everyone who took part and Mr Green hopes to report equally good results next year.

We recognise that the very best thing that your child can do to retain and build upon their Maths understanding is to spend regular time at home recapping topics that have previously been covered at school. <u>Read more</u>...

We have included some mathematical recommendations in our English Summer Reading Lists.

From Why Do Buses Come in Threes? by Rob Eastaway and Jeremy Wyndam. How fast should you run in the rain? If you run, think of all those extra raindrops that you are colliding with which you would otherwise have missed. On the other hand, if you walk you will be out in the rain for longer, catching lots of rain on your shoulders. Some serious mathematical thought has gone into this question over the years. The conclusion has been that, to stay as dry as possible, you should run as fast as you can. Read the book and find out why it is sometimes drier to walk in the rain than run.

Go4Set

EDT Inspiring future engineers & scientists

<u>EDT (Engineering Development Trust)</u> is the leading organisation working to inspire young people into careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) through business and educational links.

For 10 weeks, two teams of our pupils from Years 8/9 worked with engineers from GE Aviation on an Engineering design project called Go4SET. Pupils had a choice of three projects: 'Create Sport, 'Energy and your School, and 'My School is an Island'.

The teams chose their design brief, decided what they wanted to design, researched the technologies available, wrote a full technical report, built a scale model of their design, and prepared a presentation to explain their ideas to a panel of assessors.

Both teams took their final designs to the Celebration and Assessment Day at EDF, Barnwood, competing against pupils in Years 8 and 9 from All Saints' Academy, Katharine Lady Berkeley's School, Severn Vale School, St Edward's School, and The Cheltenham Ladies' College. "I found the experience of working with companies, such as GE Aviation, thrilling. We worked hard and deserve to pat ourselves on the back for producing what we did." Luyanda, Year 9

Year 10 GCSE Spoken English



As part of the new GCSE English Language examination, all pupils are required to give an individual presentation, on a topic of their own choice, followed by questions from their teacher and members of the class. All of these presentations are recorded on video. Pupils are awarded a Pass, Merit or Distinction and receive a certificate of Spoken English. Our pupils completed their presentations during English lessons in the first few weeks of term following the Easter holidays.

Topics varied enormously and pupils spoke about such interesting things as: gender identity and veganism. English teachers were highly impressed by both the quality of planning and the confidence with which pupils presented. Moreover, the support shown by members of the audience for their peers by means of thoughtful questioning was exemplary. We hope that the Year 10 pupils will take confidence from this experience and that this will help them when they give presentations in the future.

English Summer Homework


Couture

Ironman
