Letter to All Parents

Dear Parent/Guardian

Re 'Run, hide, tell'

As you are aware we have a duty of care to all of our pupils and through our assemblies and PSHEe programme we aim to help them develop the life skills that will enable them to stay safe in a variety of different situations.

We regularly hold fire drills to ensure we can evacuate the school in the event of an emergency and, in preparation for some school trips, we have begun to practice safety procedures based on the government guidance 'Run, hide, tell'.

Following discussions with members of our governing body we have a critical incident management plan. We have consulted with and received training from the Gloucestershire Constabulary and liaised with our neighbours Cirencester College and The Royal Agricultural University. Over recent years, we have worked with our staff and pupils to start to implement our critical incident plans for school. We need to go through the same process now with Year 7.

On Friday 4 October 2019 Miss Brace, Assistant Head, will be leading a Year 7 assembly. She will be sharing two key messages; how to stay safe in crowded places and what to do in a lockdown drill. Our aim will be to alert rather than alarm our pupils.


We plan to use the following resources which were circulated to schools in November 2017 as a part of the launch of Phase II of ACT for Youth campaign by Counter Terrorism Policing: <http://www.npcc.police.uk/CounterTerrorism/ACTforYouth.aspx>. These are designed to help educate young people on how to stay safe in the rare event of a firearms or weapon attack. These are age appropriate. However, to avoid any feelings of panic or distress, you may wish to follow the link and show your son/daughter the short animated film 'What to do in a weapons attack' (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jmYmLg-jQjc>) and talk to him/her about its content before we show it in our assembly.

In the week beginning Monday 7 October 2019 we plan to practice our lockdown drill with Year 7 and we will be talking to our pupils about how we will manage this. This will require their cooperation. While we recognise incidents requiring this type of response are extremely rare we feel it is important that our pupils are given the skills to cope in dramatic situations.
